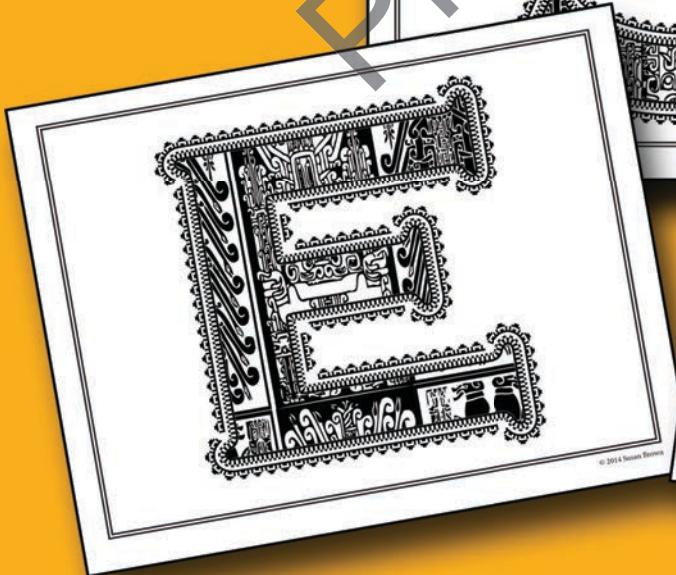
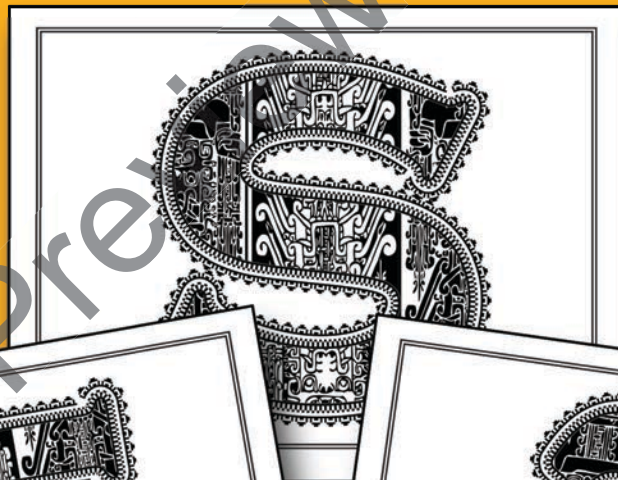

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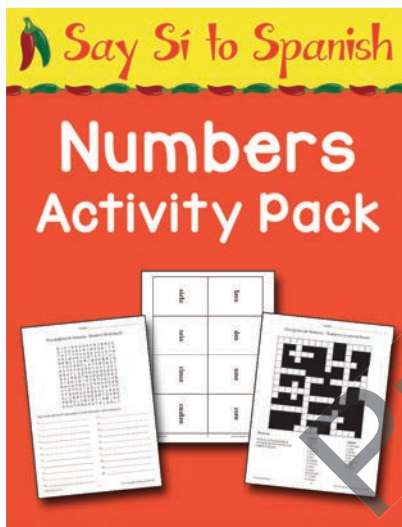
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Introduction

Activities

Which One is Missing?

Hang up all of the posters on one wall in a mixed up group. Have the students put their heads down. Take one poster down. Let the students put their heads up and try to be the first to guess which one is missing. After someone figures it out, hang the poster back up and repeat the activity.

Poster Hunt

Hide the posters around your home or classroom. Have the students find them. When they find one, have them bring it to you and tell you what it is in Spanish.

Cross the Pond

Tape the posters securely to the floor in a random order making sure they are stepping distance apart. These are the stepping stones for your pond. Have the players cross the pond one at a time by stepping from poster to poster. The correct Spanish letter must be said aloud before a player can step onto a poster.

Four Corners

Hang one poster in each corner of the room. One player stands in the middle of the room, closes his eyes, and counts to ten. Everyone else in the room has to get to one of the four corners before he reaches ten. When the center player finishes counting, he keeps his eyes shut and says the vocabulary word on one of the four posters in the room. All of the people in that corner are “out” and return to their seats. Play continues until there is only one person left.

Alphabetize Me

Pass out all of the posters to your students in a mixed up order. Some students may have to have two posters. In this case, they should letters that come together in the Spanish alphabet. Now have everyone arrange themselves in alphabetical order. Then go down the line and have each child say his letter or letters aloud.

Can You Stand It?

One at a time, tell each student to stand under a poster that you name using the Spanish phrase, “Ponte debajo de...(poster name). (*Stand under...(poster name).*) Do this until everyone is standing under a poster.

Pronunciation: Ponte debajo de... POHN-tay day-BAH-hoh day..

Where Is...?

Ask each student to point to the letter you say by using the phrase, “¿Dónde está la letra...?” (*Where is the letter...?*)

Pronunciation: ¿Dónde está la letra...? DOAN-day eh-STAH lah LAY-trah...

Point and Say It

For this activity, you'll want the posters hanging up on the walls around your room in a long row. Recite the alphabet aloud together and have the students point to each poster as they say its name.

Physical Spelling Bee

Pass out all of the posters to your students. (You may want to leave out the letters 'k' and 'w' since they aren't used very frequently in Spanish.) Some students may have to have two posters. Give the students some easy Spanish vocabulary words to spell. The words cannot have repeated letters like the word "casa" does. There are some possibilities listed below. Have the students holding the right letter posters come up and spell the word in front of the class by holding their posters. Once they get in order, say the word, then have each person say his letter aloud in order, then repeat the word.

Some words you could use for this activity are: hola, adiós, mucho, niño/a, señor, señora, hombre, mujer, vecino, uno, dos, tres, cuatro, seis, diez, quince, azul, blanco, negro, gris, español, inglés, fácil, feo, soy, estoy, mesa, lápiz, luz, silla, puerta, perro, wafle, koala

It's a Hit

This can be played with two players or two teams. You'll need a soft foam ball and a sturdy wall with no windows nearby. Tape the posters securely on the wall in a random order. Put a line down with tape about 5 - 10 feet from the wall. This is the line each player will stand behind on his turn. On each player's turn, say a random letter in Spanish. The player must throw the ball and hit the correct poster. If he does, he earns a point for himself or his team. If not, no point is earned.
