
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Introduction


What's Included in This Pack:

Activities

¿Qué Número Tengo? - What Number Do I Have?

Tape a number poster to the back of each student without allowing the student to see which number it is. Pair the students up. Have each student read the number on his partner's back. Tell them to keep it secret. Now have the students take turns guessing their number. Their partner should respond with "más" (more) or "menos" (less) to indicate whether their number is higher or lower than the guess. Students play until both partners have guessed their number.

Pronunciation:

¿Qué Número Tengo? más menos kay NOO-mair-oh TAIN-go mahs MAY-nohs

Which Number is Missing?

Hang up all of the number posters on one wall in a mixed up group. Have the students put their heads down. Take one number down. Let the students put their heads up and try to be the first to guess which number is missing. After someone figures it out, hang the number back up and repeat the activity.

Number Hunt

Hide the number posters around your home or classroom. Have the students find them. When they find one, have them bring it to you and tell you what it is in Spanish.

Matching

Print off an extra set of posters and cut the word apart from the numeral. Have students work alone or with a partner to match the pieces.

Find Your Partner

Use the poster pieces from the **Matching** activity above for this game. Take the number of students you have and divide it by two. That is the number of numerals with words you will use. For example, if you have 30 students, you will use the poster pieces for numbers 1-15. Mix up the poster pieces and pass them out face down to each student. Tell the students to keep their numbers secret. Have the students spread out around the room. Then have everyone call out their numbers and move around the room until they find the other person who has their same number.

Cross the Pond

For this activity, you'll need the top section of the poster pieces from the Matching activity. Tape the pieces securely to the floor in a random order making sure they are stepping distance apart. These are the stepping stones for your pond. Have the players cross the pond one at a time by stepping from poster to poster. The correct Spanish vocabulary word must be said aloud before a player can step onto a poster piece.

Four Corners

Hang one poster in each corner of the room. One player stands in the middle of the room, closes his eyes, and counts to ten. Everyone else in the room has to get to one of the four corners before he reaches ten. When the center player finishes counting, he keeps his eyes shut and says the vocabulary word on one of the four posters in the room. All of the people in that corner are "out" and return to their seats. Play continues until there is only one person left.

Can You Stand It?

One at a time, tell each student to stand under a poster that you name using the Spanish phase, "Ponte debajo de...(poster name). (*Stand under...(poster name*).) Do this until everyone is standing under a poster.

Pronunciation: Ponte debajo de... POHN-tay day-BAH-hoh day...

Where Is...?

For this activity, you'll want to use the the poster covers to hide the Spanish words. Ask each student to point to the number you say by using the phrase, "Donde está el número...?" (*Where is the number...?*)

Pronunciation: ¿Dónde está el número...?

DOAN-day eh-STAH lah LAY-trah...

It's a Hit

This can be played with two players or two teams. You'll need the posters with covers or the numeral parts of the cut apart posters from the **Matching** activity. You'll also need a soft foam ball and a sturdy wall with no windows nearby. Tape the posters securely on the wall in a random order. Put a line down with tape about 5 - 10 feet from the wall. This is the line each player will stand behind on his turn. On each player's turn, say a random number in Spanish. The player must throw the ball and hit the correct poster. If he does, he earns a point for himself or his team. If not, no point is earned.

Point and Say It

For this activity, you'll want the posters hanging up on the walls around your room in a long row. You can use the poster covers if desired. Recite the numbers aloud together and have the students point to each poster as they say its name.
