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



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Introduction

Activities

Remember My Heart

This game can be used to practice matching either like upper case letters or upper and lower case letters.

How to Make: Print the pages on printer paper. Glue the heart pages onto construction paper. Cut out the hearts. Laminate for durability.

How to Play: Choose 5 pairs of heart letters. Mix them up and put them face down on the table in a 4x5 grid. Turn over two hearts. If they match, take the two hearts off the grid. If they don't, turn them face down again. Continue until all hearts are matched.

Heart Hunt

This game can be used to practice identifying upper case letters, lower case letters, or numbers.

How to Make: Print the pages on printer paper or card stock. Cut out the hearts. Laminate for durability.

How to Play: Hide some of the hearts around your home or classroom. Let the children try to find the hearts. When they find one, have them bring it to you and tell you the letter or number name.

Bring Me Love

This game can be used to practice identifying upper case letters, lower case letters, or numbers.

How to Make: Print the pages on printer paper or card stock. Cut out the hearts. Laminate for durability.

How to Play: Lay out one set of hearts that are letters or numbers on a table or floor. Name a letter or number. Have your child find that it and bring it to you for a hug. Continue until all hearts are gone.

Note: You can make this game easier by using fewer hearts.

Take My Heart

This game can be used to practice identifying upper case letters, lower case letters, or numbers.

How to Make: Print the pages on printer paper or card stock. Cut out the hearts. Laminate for durability.

How to Play: Lay out six random hearts on a table. Ask the child, "Where is the capital R?" or "Where is the number 8?" When the child points to the correct heart, tell him, "Take My Heart." He takes the heart and puts it in a pile. Replace the missing heart with a new one and continue.

Count on My Heart

This game can be used to practice counting.

How to Make: Print the number pages on printer paper or card stock. Cut out the hearts. Laminate for durability. Gather candy hearts or some other manipulative for counting.

How to Play: Lay out the number hearts with the manipulatives. Have the child count the number of manipulatives to match each number and set them on the hearts. For example, if the heart says “5”, he should put five items on the heart.

Heart Problems

This game can be used to practice math problems.

How to Make: Print multiple copies of the number pages and math symbols on printer paper or card stock. Cut out the hearts. Laminate for durability. If desired, gather candy hearts or some other manipulative for the child to use to assist him in solving the problems.

How to Play: Set up math problems with the number and symbol hearts, i.e. “ $6 + 4 =$ ”, or “ $9 - 5 =$ ”. Put out the other number hearts. Have the child use these hearts to answer the math problems.
